### **Counting Young Children in the 2020 Census**

An estimated 5 percent of kids under the age of 5 weren't counted in the 2010 Census. That's about1 million young children, the highest of any age group.

### **Census Bureau Launches Updated Website**

The U.S. Census Bureau recently launched a new version of <u>2020census.gov</u>. The new website adds <u>features, resources, and materials</u> to help inform the public about the 2020 Census.

The site includes dozens of new "Statistics in Schools" materials, a new webpage to share facts about the 2020 Census, information on applying for jobs, and frequently asked questions (FAQs).

A <u>"Fighting 2020 Census Rumors</u>" page is designed to share the facts about the 2020 Census and fight misinformation. Users can report false information to <u>rumors@census.gov</u> or visit the webpage to get 2020 Census facts.

- Full site translation into Spanish
- Increase in mobile organization
- New information on the <u>count of young children</u>
- Updated <u>resources and information for census partners</u> that can be filtered by language

### 2018 Census Poverty & Health Insurance Data Released

On September 10th, the U.S. Census Bureau released its latest data on income, earnings, income inequality, and poverty. The report finds that median household income, controlling for inflation, increased by .9 percent in the past year, while the official poverty rate has dropped 0.5 percentage points, from 12.3 to 11.8 percent, which is statistically significant. However, the Supplemental Poverty Measure (SPM) -which factors in tax credits, government assistance programs, and expenses -indicates no statistical difference in the amount of Americans living in poverty from 2017 to 2018, nearly half of which are living below 50 percent of the poverty threshold, otherwise known as "deep poverty." Moreover, the poverty rate among both African-Americans and Hispanics remained more than twice the rate among non-Hispanic whites, which was 8.1 percent.

# Income Gap Between Rich and Poor Continues to Grow, with Deadly Effects

The expanding gap between rich and poor is widening the gulf in incomes and wealth in America. It is helping the rich lead longer lives, while cutting short the lives of those who are struggling, according to <u>a study</u> released by the Government Accountability Office.

Almost three-quarters of rich Americans who were in their 50s and 60s in 1992 were still alive in 2014. Conversely, just over half of poor Americans in their 50s and 60s in 1992 lived to see to 2014. To read the full article, <u>click here</u>.

The <u>Institute on Assets and Social Policy (IASP)</u> at Heller School for Social Policy and Management at Brandeis University released powerful findings on the destructive long-term impacts of holding student loans, especially for first generation students and students of color.

"Stalling Dreams: How Student Debt is Disrupting Life Chances and Widening the Racial Wealth Gap" reveals how student loans widen the racial wealth gap and threaten long-term economic security for those who cannot count on family wealth to support their educational ambitions.
